As we reflect on the successes achieved at our hospital, we are thrilled with the progress that we have made and how we continue to be a leader in the delivery of rural healthcare. Over the last twelve months, some of the accomplishments include:

- The implementation of a video link between the Kingston Trauma unit and our Emergency department that allows a real time connection to address the needs of our patients.
- Receiving the 2012 Quality Healthcare Workplace Gold Award in recognition of excellence for quality healthcare workplaces. This is the second time that we are in receipt of the gold award.
- Our patient safety advocate program continues to receive provincial recognition in Hospital News with the latest story about our Falls Prevention Strategy.
- Our Restorative Care program has been open for just over a year with a focus to ensure seniors who have been hospitalized from an illness and are getting well, will have additional supports to regain their strength and return home quickly and safely. The

- program has seen 109 patients with 73% or 80 of these patients returning to independent living. As well, our ALC days have decreased by 45% or 1,656 days.
- The hospital achieved a financial surplus of \$4,004.
- The hospital continued to commit to provide accessible care to our patients within our resources by opening a Nephrology Clinic.
- CMH continues to invest in wellness programs for staff. The latest initiative was the opening of a gym dedicated to the memory of a former employee, Marlene Milne.
- The Campbellford Memorial Hospital Foundation, Campbellford Seymour Community Foundation and the Municipality of Trent Hills have partnered together in a joint wellness program to ensure residents have access to the highest quality of life, health and well-being. Additional funds will be used by the hospital towards the purchase of priority capital equipment including a digital mammography machine.

Palliative Care

The last year has brought forth some exciting improvements to the palliative care we can provide to our patients. An entire day was dedicated in November to Palliative Care Management. Jan Raine, Kerri Shudall RN and Patti Stanton were instrumental in bringing this together. There is a Palliative Care Nurse Practitioner seeing patients at their homes - she is working closely with family physicians.

Diagnostic Imaging

Dr. Glenn Garneys, a radiologist from Peterborough Regional Health Centre, is the head of diagnostic imaging for Campbellford now. He is attending our Medical Advisory Committee meetings regularly. We have seen positive changes in the reporting times with his support.

Chief of Staff Report

Thank you for the opportunity to share some of the stories about the hard work of the staff of this lovely hospital with you.

It is a pleasure to report that Campbellford Memorial Hospital is doing really well with our Restorative Care Unit located on the second floor of the hospital. Patients admitted to the hospital, and who need some form of strengthening and conditioning before returning home, are benefitting from this program.

An Automatic External Defibrillator has been bought for the second floor. All our defibrillators are on the first floor or on ground floor. The AED, as it is known, was placed to provide our patients with the best possible chance of defibrillation, should that be necessary. In other words, if you suffer a heart attack while on floor two, we can shock you with this device in an attempt to restore your heart to a normal rhythm.

In that vein, we are satisfied with the process instituted to transfer patients to Peterborough Regional Health Centre who had a certain type of myocardial infarction — we talk about Code STEMI patients. These patients need urgent Percutaneous Coronary Intervention. The door to balloon time is 90 minutes — from our door to the Interventional Suite in Peterborough! Well done EMS, ER physicians and Interventional Cardiologists.

Nephrologists from Peterborough are now seeing patients once a month in the clinic here at the hospital. This is of great benefit to those who cannot travel that far.

September 2012 saw a few cases of Pertussis, or better known as whooping cough. Elderly patients were not exempt from coming down with whooping cough. This served as a reminder that vaccinations against childhood diseases are necessary and also provides protection to those who are frail. Vaccination against Pertussis is available to adults up to the age of 59.

We welcomed Dr. Ali Witt to the staff last year. She is a GP anesthetist. Ali and her husband Jonathan moved to the area. Jonathan is completing his residency. She is a wonderful addition to our medical staff. It has been a joy to have Jonathan here as a resident over the last month.



Best Practice Nursing

There are many nursing champions who work diligently and with great dedication to ensure that our patients receive the best nursing care available. What most people don't realize is that our education does not stop upon graduation. Health care is comprised of ever-evolving science and best practices.

Campbellford Memorial Hospital is a small rural hospital that delivers optimum patient care. Our commitment to education is demonstrated by investing in our staff or "growing our own" as we like to say.

Best practice is governed by external professional bodies such as the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario and the Registered Practical Nurses Association of Ontario. These organizations provide educational opportunities and conferences ensuring best practice and quality of care. 



Telemedicine Based Support for Resuscitative Care

Campbellford Memorial Hospital (CMH) and Kingston Resuscitation Institute (KRI) have partnered together to facilitate the provision of excellent resuscitative care for patients who require emergency medical management at CMH. Through a camera system mounted in the CMH Emergency Department, the CMH physician who is involved in a resuscitation has the ability to consult with a KRI physician with specialized training and expertise in resuscitative medicine with minimal effort any time of the day. The camera system allows the KRI physician to be able to visualize the condition of the patient, procedures being performed on the patient and monitor information. Audio access is also provided to allow hands free communication.

Dr. Norm Bartlett, Chief of CMH Emergency Department states, "this system is another way that CMH is able to provide safe and timely care win consultation with a trauma centre".

Restorative Care Program a Success

As a physiotherapist at CMH, I have worked with many patients within the Restorative Care Program. The aim of the program is to optimize patient mobility and function to facilitate a safe discharge home. What makes my job so enjoyable is working with patients like Mary Derry. When she first arrived Mary struggled with a fear of falling and required assistance with her activities of daily living. With participation in Restorative Care, Mary was able to return home to her previous level of functioning. The success of this story would not have been made possible without the help of Mary's family and community supports. When followed up three months later Mary and her family recalled the program helping immensely and the experience being enjoyable.

Physiotherapists Have a Unique Perspective on Safety

As a physiotherapist working in a hospital setting, you see the world differently from others, according to Melissa Bedford. Melissa and her colleague Tracy Thompson are physiotherapists at Campbellford Memorial Hospital supporting people in the hospital's in-patient unit as well as those in the hospital's Restorative Care program.

"Our role is about educating people on the potential risks for falls or injuries often present in a health care setting," says Melissa, "Not only are we looking out for our patients, but we are also looking out for our nursing staff to ensure they are transferring patients correctly, and avoiding injury on the job by protecting their backs and using mechanical lifts to help move patients safely."

We're trained to look at people differently. We look at how they are moving to determine if they are likely to fall more easily than someone else.

The hospital's physiotherapists provide assessment, treatment and consultation to patients with movement dysfunction. As many in their profession, they strive to achieve optimal health outcomes and use resources efficiently and safely.

"We work with a variety of patients here. Our job is to assess each patient, seeing their care needs from a physiotherapy perspective. This includes understanding how to mobilize the patient and make sure they are transferred and positioned safely when they are under care at the hospital. This also includes doing a falls assessment to determine their frailty and

risk of falling. If there is a risk of falling, then we ensure the proper information is shared with the rest of the care team regarding this risk. This includes having information posted at the patient's bed side, in their medical chart and within other patient records accessed by the care team," says Tracy.

"In our Restorative Care Program, our patients need a higher level of physical therapy and related care to transition from the hospital or from an injury that has impacted their mobility back to their home again. Many of these patients are elderly and living alone at home. We work with them to assess their needs, help them get stronger, and work with their families to plan for their discharge and return home. We really want to promote independent living as much as possible," adds Tracy.

"We're trained to look at people differently. We look at how they are moving to determine if they are likely to fall more easily than someone else. We also

gather information about their history to understand if they've fallen before. We seek to determine if they've had balance is- sues. We also do a walk-through of the areas where they will be receiving care and support walking to remove any tripping hazards," she says.

Campbellford Memorial Hospital officially launched its Restorative Care Program a little over a year ago. This program is designed to ensure that local seniors, who have been hospitalized for an illness and are getting well, will have additional supports to regain their strength and return home quickly and safety. This is a transitional program for typically elderly inpatients requiring low intensity therapy to improve their strength, endurance, or functioning so they can return to their home safely following hospital care.

There are three key program benefits:

- Levels of individual function and independence are expected to improve with the support of a multidisciplinary team resulting in a safe transition from hospital to home
- •Family members and care givers are engaged in the program and are better informed about individual care plans, and
- CMH is providing an environment that encourages more effective transition to home, and reduces the chances of patient readmission to the hospital or a pro- longed hospital stay

"We're fostering a culture that empowers a hospital setting that is sensitive to the needs of our patients and our Restorative Care Program is an example of that. Our staff and our board recognized the need for this kind of program because we know that it will help us to provide even better care for our senior patients. By linking this program with our ongoing Home First partnership with the Central East Community Care Access Centre and Community Care Northumberland, we are confident that we are providing better patient care while meeting our Alternate Level of Care targets and improving our emergency department wait times," says Brad Hilker, President and CEO, Campbellford Memorial Hospital

"Our Restorative Care program is another example where our team of professionals like Tracy and Melissa can demonstrate their passion and drive for excellent care, while ensuring our patients have the additional support they require to return home quickly and safely," says Jan Raine, Chief Nursing Officer, Campbellford Memorial Hospital.

"Working in a hospital this size provides many opportunities for professional development you might not get in a larger hospital setting," says Melissa. "At Campbellford Memorial Hospital, we get more hands on experience, have opportunities to serve on different committees or help establish new policies or procedures."

For example, Tracy recently implemented a new Falls Risk Assessment Protocol called the 'Falling Leaf' protocol. "There was an opportunity to improve upon the original falls assessment program and so, in conjunction with the Risk Coordinator, Dianne Laroche, we devised a new system. Every patient admitted to the hospital is assessed with the new assessment form. If they are deemed a falls risk, then they are identified by wearing a purple wrist band, and a leaf sticker is placed on the patient information board in their room, on their patient chart and on the nursing kardex. The physiotherapists also perform specialized balance tests (Tinetti and Berg) to further assess their risk of falls and to devise a special balance exercise regime to further prevent falls. We also teach people to get up off the floor!" she explains.

"This is also a friendly and family-oriented environment. There are a lot of patients who are admitted here who know other patients or staff. I think this familiarity and the related support they get from others gives patients a lot of reassurance and that helps with their recovery," adds Melissa.



New Campbellford Memorial Hospital (CMH) Programs Focused On Providing Quality Care and Better Access to the Right Kind of Care for Patients

Jan Raine, Chief Nursing Officer with Campbellford Memorial Hospital provided the hospital's board of directors with an update on some new patients programs. These programs include Palliative Care, Restorative Care, a new Integrated Chronic Disease Management Program offered in partnership with the Trent Hills Family Health Team and a Nephrology Clinic. All are designed to ensure that area patients receive access to the kind of care they require most and who have access to a multidisciplinary team of health care professionals working together to ensure the best outcome for their patients and their families.

The new Palliative Care initiative will see all patients who present to CMH receiving optimum palliative treatment based on the best practice guidelines developed by the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario. The hospital is partnering with Community Care Access Centre, Trent Hills Family Health Team, Community Care Northumberland, and Bridge Hospice to provide a "wrap around" service to provide the best support for people who are approaching end of life. The hospital is measuring and monitoring the number of patients with a diagnosis of palliative who have been assessed daily for Palliative Performance Score (PPS). This score is a way of measuring the progressive decline of a palliative patient to make

sure they get the right level of care close to home in the right place.

The initiative is still in the early stages of development, but showing initial signs of success. The Palliative Group is responding to the need for more collaboration and better communication with our partners. We have now established a strong community network with a palliative focus. Working together, we have documented a current and future state of a patient's potential palliative journey highlighting the different pathways of care. The group has a better understanding of each other's services. The next step is to discuss the potential for palliative rounds and to understand the scope of palliative patients in our community. The group played a fundament role in facilitating collaboration of the referral process for our new community hospice.

As well, in addition to the hospital's commitment to empower its patients and provide them with tools to self-manage their chronic illness and prevent further deterioration due to the disease, Campbellford Memorial Hospital is introducing a nephrology clinic. This clinic will provide patients diagnosed with renal disease to benefit from consultation and care provided by a team of nephrologists from Peterborough who will work with patients to stabilize the illness and hopefully delay its progression. Initially, the Nephrologists will see patients at the hospital's Outpatient Clinic once per month.

The Integrated Chronic Disease Management Program (ICDMP) is an initiative being offered in partnership with the Trent Hills Family Health Team, Northumberland Community Care, and Community Living to area patients who are managing chronic disease for example Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease or Congestive Heart Failure. The program is intended for those individuals who have been assessed and would benefit from attending a seven week program to enable them to assist in the management of their disease. The multidisciplinary care team includes nurses, pharmacists, physiotherapists and recreational therapists. The aim of the program is to achieve the following:

- work collaboratively through an integrated health team to provide a greater understanding of chronic diseases;
- provide individuals with holistic education to enable healthy life choices and achieve selfmanagement of their chronic diseases; and
- facilitate engagement in the program to establish greater confidence and education regarding the management of the individuals chronic disease.

The program will accommodate eight – ten outpatients per program. Consisting of 90 minute weekly meeting running for a period of seven continuous weeks and participates are expected to commit to attend all seven meetings. The clients will be identified for assessment for this program either by their family health team doctor or at point of discharge from Campbellford Memorial Hospital by the discharge planner. All patients attending the program must be medically stable to be able to participate in the program.

The McCulloch Family recently attended an informal ceremony at Campbellford Memorial Hospital to celebrate the life of their beloved family members – Eric & Jean McCulloch. Eric & Jean who were married for 63 years, passed away within a year of each other. The wishes of the family were to see donations made In Memory of Eric & Jean go to the Campbellford Hospital, who cared for them both over the years. The donations accumulated to over \$1,000, allowing for Eric & Jean to be recognized on the hospital donor wall.

The McCulloch's had the opportunity to view the CT Suite and hear about how those donations help patients each day followed with enjoying light refreshments and fellowship. The family noted afterwards:

Dr. Joe's 13 in '13

"As a doctor at Campbellford Memorial Hospital, I treat a diverse group of patients with a range of health care issues. I could not provide the necessary care without the essential medical equipment available at the hospital. When a patient presents with a cough and pneumonia is suspected, a portable x-ray machine is needed. A patient with a family history of colon cancer may need a colonoscopy as part of the screening process. If someone needs to be admitted as an in-patient, then a bed and an IV pump may be needed.
